HOUSTON, Texas - President Kennedy wound up a day of "nonpolitical" campaigning in the Lone Star State Thursday night with almost a hurricane of political controversy swirling about him.

The divided Texas Democratic party continued its feuds as the President visited San Antonio and Houston in balmy springlike weather with large and mostly curious crowds turning out to see him and the First Lady.

The day got off to a bad start, politically, even before the presidential Jet 707 reached San Antonio in early afternoon.

Sen. Ralph Yarborough, in the same plane as the President, let go with a blast at Gov. John B. Connally as the big plane speeded toward Texas

Yarborough, in effect, issued a statement in which he was sharply critical of Connally for failing to invite him to a reception at the Governor's Mansion Friday evening.

"Shortly after the shooting, we raced back into the building and saw him in a small storage room on the ground floor," Mr. Campbell said, "Then, we noticed he was gone. He didn't have permission to leave and we haven't seen him since."

Vice President Lyndon B. John son was sworn in as President of the United States by U.S. Dist. Judge Sarah T. Hughes aboard the presidential jet at Love Field.

Shortly before 3 p.m., Mr. Johnson ralsed his right hand and said: "It do solemnly swear that I will faithfully execute the office of President of the United States."

Mr. Johnson was to leave immediately after for Washington.

Photographer Bob Jackson of The Times Herald heard one shot and then two more rapid shots. From his vantage point in an open convertible, the eighth car in the procession, Jackson saw two men peering from the building window on the fifth floor.

President Kennedy, still cradled in his wife's arms, was rushed to emergency. Blood transfusions of B positive blood were administered.

Shortly before 1 p.m. two Catholic priests entered emergency. Several minutes later they emerged and announced the President was dead.

White House assistant press secretary Malcolm Kilduff said at 1:30 p.m.:

"President John F. Rennedy died at approximately 1 c'olock Central Standard Time, He died of a gunshot wound in the brain."

Mr. Kilduff said Gov. Connally was hit once in the left side and once in the wrist. Vice President Johnson escaped injury.

An Oncal Funeral Home hearse took the President's body from Parkiand Hospital at 2:08 p.m. His body was to be flown to Washington.

Mrs. Kennedy left Parkland Hospital surrounded by police officers shortly after the body of her husband was placed in the hearse. She spoke briefly to an Air Force officer and then left in the hearse.

Gov. Connally's Austin office, in contact with Parkland Hospital by a "hot line," had reported the governor's condition at 1:41 p.m. as "serious." This was later changed to satisfactory.

Press secretary George Christian said the governor was hit in the right chest, front and back; had a fracture of the radius and a minor leg wound.

He said X-rays were just taken and the governor was prepared for surgery.

As FBI Director J. Edgar Hoovered ordered Dallas FBI men into the extensive search for the assassin, investigators reported finding the rifle thought to have fired the fatal shots.

War II surplus weapon with a telescopic sight, was uncovered in the northwest corner of the sixth floor of the book depository building. The weapon with a shell still in it was found half hidden under stacks of school and religious books.

In front of an open window, Police Sgt, Jerry Hill said, three expended rifle shells were discovered. By the window were remnants of fried chicken.

A wall of book boxes had been erected and three boxes in front of the window were believed to have been used by the sniper to steady his aim. There were unconfirmed reports that a Secret Service agent was also killed by gunfire.

A spokesman at the Secret Service headquarters at Dallas said could not confirm or deny the report.

"All I've heard," he told newsmen, "is the same reports you've heard."

Sheriff Bill Decker reported his investigators had picked up two eye-witnesses to the shooting who had seen a man with a rifle.

"I couldn't question them here on the street. They claim they can identify the person with the rifle if they see him," the sheriff said.





defectives arrived to search the book building and
surrounding structures.
Firemen joined the search of the building, using
hook-and-ladder fire trucks to upper floors to aid
in the search with high-powered spotlights.
At 2:30 p.m. the search of the building was

Witnesses standing on a balcony at the court-house gave this account of what they saw:

The motorcade had just turned into Houston Street from Main Street when a shot rang out. Pigeons flew up from the street. Then, two more shots rang out and Mr. Kennedy fell to the floor of the car.

Deputy Police Chief Ray Lunday, leading the procession through Dallas, said he thought the shots were fired as the President's car neared the Triple Underpass.

Police issued a pickup order for an unknown white male, about 30, slender, 5-10, 165 pounds, armed with a 30 caliber rifle.

Police swarmed the book depository as the stunned crowd of persons watching the downtown parade watched.

Sgt. G. D. Hensley, police dispatcher, directed all available police units to the downfown area near the western edge of downfown Dallas.

The Presidential convoy cut off its route and sped at high speed immediately toward Parkland Hospital where doctors were ordered to stand by. The motorcade, originally set to turn off Industrial by the Trade Mart, sped straight down Industrial toward Harry Hines.

The police radio blared that the President had been hit.

after the snooning the President appeared to be hit twice.

"The first time he slumped and the second one really blasted him." These were the words of Charles Drehm, 38, of 1619 Kings Highway.

"After the first shot the President's wife rose slightly to hold the President and they both went down in the second shot. He was definitely hit badly," Mr. Drehm said.

Mr. Drehm said the President was half standing, waving to the crowd, when he heard the first of two shots. He said after the President was knocked down, apparently by the second shot, the President's car roared underneath the triple underpass.

underpass.

The President, his limp body cradled in the arms of his wife, was rushed to Parkland Hospital. The Governor also was taken to Parkland. Clint Hill, a Secret Service agent assigned to Mrs. Kenndy, said "he's dead," as the President was lifted from the rear of a White House touring car, the famous "Bubbletop" from Washington. He was rushed to an emergency room in the hospital. Even at high speed it took nearly five minutes to get the car to the ambulance entrance of the hospital.

Fire equipment was rushed to the building from which the shots were believed to have been fired. Firemen roped off the area as Secret Service men and city police swarmed through the building.

A tight security lid apparently was clamped on at Parkland Hospital.

At the Triple Underpass, large numbers of the crowd were milling around half sobbing, half hysterically shouting. "The President's shot!"

Women and children and men stopped one another and police to ask plaintively, "Is the President alive! God, how horrble." Although most of the law officers present felt the builets came from the Texas Schoolbook Depository Building, which

towers above the underpass at Houston and Main Streets, a large number of the crowd could not say for sure where the shots came from or how many shots were fired.

"I definitely heard three shots," said Bo

Mabrey.

Police immediately began rounding up large numbers of bystanders who may have seen something related to the infamous shooting.

The witness Drehm was shaking uncontrollably as he further described the shooting.

"The first shot must not have been too solid, because he just slumped. Then on the second shot he seemed to fall back."

Drehm seemed to think the shots came from in front of or beside the President. He explained the President did not slamp forward as if he would have after being shot from the rear. The book empository building stands in the rear of the President's location at the time of the shooting.

Apparently the President's car was on the down slope midway between Houston Street and the triple underprass.

Drehm said he was within 10 feet of the President at the time of the shooting.

"It was definitely a rifle," he said.

Mrs. Jean Hill, 9402 Bluff Creek, and Mrs. Mary Moorman, 2823 Lipplewood, who were among witnesses at the Triple Underpass, said the motorcade stopped suddenly and then swittly sped on with the sirens blowing.
"I thought I saw someone in the motorcade in street dress shoot back at a person running up the hill.
"The motorcade kept on going at the usual

"Some of the motorcycle policemen sped up and some stopped. I didn't see anyone get in the car with the President.

Mrs. Moorman, who snapped a pleture just at the time the President was shot, and said:

"I took the pleture exactly at the moment the shot rang out. My Polaroid shows Kennedy slumped over in the car and it shows Jackie leaning towards him.

"I heard Mrs. Kennedy say, 'My God, he's been shot."

Officers on the case would not explain what connection the man might have with the shooting nor would they identify him.

The sheriff's office was becoming headquarters for one of the largest organized manbunts in history as federal officers, and state, local and county law enforcement officers combed the area interviewing every possible suspect or witness.

Minutes following the shooting, police and law enforcement officials were swarming all over the Texas Schoolbook Depository after creeting barricades. Fire trucks with hooks and ladders converged on the seven-story building, which commands the eastern end of the Triple Underpass.

The assassin, firing from the sixth floor of the Texas School Book Depository Building near the Triple Underpass sent a Mauser 6.5 riffe bullet smashing into the President's head.

An hour after the President died, police hauled the 24-year-old suspect, Lee Harvey Oswald, out of an Oak Cliff movie house.

He had worked for a short time at the depository, and police had encountered him while searching the building shortly after the assassination. They turned him loose when he was identified as an employe but put out a pickup order on him when he failed to report for a work roll call.

He also was accused of killing a Dallas policeman, J. D. Tippit, whose body was found during the vast manhunt for the President's assassin.

Oswald, who has an extensive pro-Communist background, four years ago renounced his American citizenship in Russia and tried to become a Russian citizen. Later, he returned to this country.

Shockingly, the President was shot after driving the length of Main Street through a crowd termed the largest and friendliest of his 2-day Texas visit. Pandemonium Erupts at Scene

One of the two Secret Service men in the front seat of the car grabbed the car telephone.

"Let's go straight to the nearest hospital," he called to the leading cars of the motorcade.

The scene behind them was pandemonium. Spectators were throwing themselves upon chillidren to protect them. Uniformed police swarmed up the grassy parkway toward the schoolbook warehouse and up the railway embankment, Secret Service men quickly unholstered guns.

At 70 mlles an hour the presidential car sped to Parkland. At the emergency entrance, Connally was able to lurch heavily toward the waiting stretcher. Mrs. Kennedy helped lift her husband onto the stretcher, and Secret Service men assisted her into the hospital. She looked stunned but showed no signs of hysteria.

Massive Blood Transfusions Given

The President was taken first to a room off the emergency lobby, and Dr. Malcolm Perry, a resident surgeon, and Dr. Kemp Clark, head neuro-surgeon, began massive blood transfusions. At least 8 or 10 other doctors were in attendance.

The doctors also performed a tracheotomy to aid the President to breathe,

aid the President to breathe.

Parkland doctors said later that it was apparent that President Kennedy was not alive when he was brought into the hospital. Kennedy had two rounds, one in the throat just below the Adam's appie and another in the back of his head, "a large gaping Ward with considerable loss of tissue."

"There was no spontaneous respiration," said old the construction of the construction

"Technically, however, by using airways, vigorous resuscitation, intravenous tubes and all the usual supportive measures, we were able to raise a semblance of a heart beat.

Shires said it was a technicality over whether the President could be called dead instantly, dead on arrival or dead 30 minutes after the arrival.

"My staff reported that they never at any time had any hope for the President's life," he said. Connally remained lucid right up to the moment that he went under anesthesia.

"Take care of Nellie (his wife)," he murmured to an aide who was with him at the hospital.

Bullet Strikes Connally in Back

The bullet that hit Comnally in the back went through his chest, taking out a part of the fifth rib and collapsing the lung. The bullet then went into his right wrist, causing a compound fracture, and then buried itself in his left thigh.

"His doctor, Robert R. Shaw, professor of thoracic surgery at Southwestern Medical School, termed Connally's condition as satisfactory considering his injury.

"I have reason to believe Gov. Connally will recover without significant disability," he said and guessed that the healing process would take 10 to

Doctors said it was a stroke of luck that Connally happened to turn after hearing the first shot.

Officers Launch 2-City Manhunt

While the doctors were working frantically at the hospital, police, Secret Service men and FBI agents had started a 2-city manhunt.

They arrested several persons, among them a Fort Worth man who was said to be driving a car linked with the slayer.

In a room-by-room search of the schoolbook depository, they found the rifle hidden between stacks of basic readers on the sixth floor. At a window at the southeast corner, they found three spent cartridges. There also they found the remnants of a piece of chicken and a soft drink bottle, indicating that the killer had been at his station for some time.

Police had encountered Oswald, who works in the building, during their check of the building but had allowed him to go when he was found to be an employe. They put out a pickup order for him when they discovered that he had been in the building at the time of the shooting.

Police theorize that Tippit was trying to arrest Oswald in the 400 block of East 10th and lost his life in the attempt.

Mrs. Helen Markham, who was waiting for a bus in that block, said Tippit spotted Oswald on

the sidewalk and pulled up the police car to talk

to him.

Shooting Described by Woman.

Mrs. Markham said that Oswald walked over to the police car and leaned in the window to say something to Tippit. The officer then got out of the car to say something to Oswald.

"All of a sudden they stopped, looked at each other and he pulled this gun and shot him down," said Mrs. Markham.

"I ran to the officer to see if I could help him," she said. "I was afraid he was going to kill me, too, but I knew I had to help that officer."

Oswald fied.

Mrs. Markham said Tippit tried to say something as he lay dying.

"But he never got it out. He knew I was there, though."

In a store-by-store search of the area, police found Oswald a few minutes later in the Texas Theater, where a movie called "War is Hell" was playing.

Oswald, member of a respected Fort Worth fam-ily, is a former Marine. Four years ago he turned up in Moscow, renounced his American citizen-ship and asked for Russian citizenship. The Rus-sians refused. Oswald refused to stay in the Soviet Union as a resident alien and returned to the United States.

House Un-American Activities Committee records identify him as secretary of the New Orleans chapter of Fair Play for Cuba. Records also show that Oswald identified himself as a Marxist in a radio debate in New Orleans during the summer of 1962.

Word of the murder of the President swept rapidly through the city. All over town shocked and grieving people had gathered around radio sets to learn of his condition. The diners at the Trade Mart pushed saide their steaks and hunted radios after the first news.

He urged the crowd to remain calm, but women were dabbing their eyes and men were shaking their heads.
"Those damned fanatics," one man shouted. "Why do we have to have them in Dallas?"
The Rev. Luther Holcomb led a prayer for the President and governor.
The crowd was still in confusion when the news came seconds later over the radio that the President was dead. A woman screamed.

Hundreds Gather Around Hospital

Meanwhile hundreds of weeping and somber people had gathered around the hospital during the long wait between the President's entrance and the official announcement of his death.

They stopped newspapermen moving in and out of buildings and pleaded for news of the President's conditions.

Congressman Henry B. Gonzalez of San Antonio stood inside the hospital, staring into space, grasping a limp brown paper sack in his hand. Sen. Ralph Yarborough was crying. Vice-President Johnson, whose car in the motorcade was separated by 60 feet from the assassination, was shown to a small anteroom off the emergency lobby and sat there alone, grim and shaken. After a few minutes, Mrs. Johnson, tearful and shaken, rushed inside to him.

Two priests appeared and went to the presidential floor. One of them, Father Oscar Huber of Holy Trinity Church, said when they came down that he had administered the last rites of the

There were rumors that Kennedy was dead. The first official sign came a few seconds after the priests had departed when a cordon of Secret Service men cleared a path to the door of the new President, Lyndon B. Johnson.



THE ASSASINATION of President John F. Kennedy is a cruel, shameful mark in this city's listory and a tragedy for the country which has been under his guidance. But, as many experienced investors could warm, there's often a hidden stinger in ideas for getting rich out of the binds and the bees. And it's the human beings who get stung.




